WHO AM I?

Who Am I? A question that people have asked themselves since the beginning of time. "Cogito Ergo Sum" I think therefore I am the famous words of the Mathematician and Philosopher, Rene' Descartes, whose writings were banned by the Pope in 1663. What is to be human? We have mind, spirit, soul, awareness, and consciousness. What makes us different than other beings? We use language and have opposable thumbs? This is a question that has plagued philosophers for millennia. The questions and answers do not have to be in opposition to religion but rather help us in our discernment. When we ask questions, we are seeking meaning about our existence, we are introspective and undergoing self-examination, which is necessary for growth and clarity. We are driven to be seen and recognized for our uniqueness. As Christians we are the same as we know God created us all in his image, Imago Dei (Gen 1:27) and we are 'very good' (Gen 1:31). But we are also individual.

What about our individual identity? We ask, 'Who Am I in Christ?' 'What is my Christian identity?' In answering we start in scripture. In our baptisms, we have died as sinners (individuals) and are raised in Christ. Romans 6:3-5,22, states "all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his."

As baptized Christians we have "... been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life." Sanctification is the action of being freed from sin or purified; or to be made holy. As baptized Christians, it is our lifelong process of Christian formation.

As we continue on our discipleship journey, we gain clarity and further define our identity in Christ. As the church, we make up the body of Christ, but we are all on a different spot on the discipleship pathway. We are either Discovering Christ, Transforming in Christ, Growing in Christ, or Rooted in Christ. And, as Beulah Christians, we covenant together "to be faithful in providing opportunities for spiritual growth through Seeking, Sharing, and Serving God." As individuals that make up the whole (the church/the body of Christ), we choose how to live out our identity in a way that resonates with our essence, we live into who God made us to be, and we listen to the call the Holy Spirit puts on our heart. We may focus on our prayer life, our scripture reading, or our service to the community. In our prayer life we may live it out different ways, in worship, in art, and in dance. Possibilities are endless in our personal growth and in our pleasing God.

Though we are all made in God's image, and we all make up the body of Christ, we remain unique and diverse in our Identity in Christ.

We desire to work together to build communities physically and spiritually in Haiti. We do not dictate to Haitians what or how projects should be done in our community. Instead, we work alongside our local community to bring about change in ways that are culturally appropriate. We seek to empower, encourage, and equip those in our community who are already working and leverage our networks and resources as available. We invest, teach and disciple as we have the opportunity and do not pass up a chance to point others to the love of Christ. We are in community together and we desire to love Jesus and love Haiti together.

Ask a Haitian what a "konbit" is and they will instantly light up and proudly share with you the meaning because it goes back to their roots. A konbit is a term used to describe when a group of people come together to accomplish a project in their community. It is a term that embodies the solidarity among the Haitian people and the desire to do whatever one can to help their community advance. The payment for their hours of work is usually a meal and a strengthened sense of community and pride in the work being done. It is a beautiful thing to witness and it speaks volumes about our brothers and sisters here in Haiti. It is in this spirit that we launched Konbit and this is what we desire to reflect in our work alongside Haitians.

Kris and Rachael Coleman (a former employee of Beulah UMC) met at school, Rockford Masters Commission, in 1995 and were married in 1997. In over 20 years of life together, they have served as Youth Ministers and a bit as Associate Pastors. Their heart for God, discipling, and living life with people has dominated their everyday life since before they met. Ministering to the lost and broken in America was their collective heartbeat long before God called them out of America. In 2013, God called their family to serve in Haiti. Their ministry in Haiti began in May 2015 when Kris, Rachael, and their 3 children, Anna, Levi, and Lydia, moved there to live and work. Konbit is a natural expression of their desire to minister like Jesus in an organic and community-driven environment.

Throughout the years, we've had many programs and they were all based upon the needs that were in front of us. Some programs were for a few weeks, some for a season, and others have been longstanding because the need persists. Our heartbeat behind any program we host is to connect with community members, meet a physical need, and be there to speak to their spiritual need by sharing Christ. We desire to walk alongside people and "do life" together. That includes being there for the good, the bad, the ugly, the frustrating, and the unknown at times. It includes meeting the same needs over and over again sometimes, and other times, it means helping once and maybe never seeing them again. Through our programs, we seek to steward our resources well and care for people the best we can in all the ways we can both physically and spiritually.

BEHIND THE MASK

One of my favorite books is an allegory called the Pilgrims Regress written by CS Lewis. It was the first book he wrote as a Christian and is his interpretation of another book called the Pilgrims Progress. He wrote it while reflecting on his life, the world, and the witnessing of God therein. It starts with a young child named John.

When John is old enough to "know better" he is dressed in itchy clothes and taken to see the Steward who speaks on behalf of the Landlord who owns all the land. John's family and the Landlord all wear a happy face mask so no one can see who they really are. John is given a card of instructions and told he must follow the rules or the Landlord who is kind and just will throw him into a pit of giant lobsters. When John gets home and reads the card, he finds that it is confusing and impossible to follow on his own. He must wear his mask, so the Landlord won't find out he has failed. John runs away in search of a mystical island where surely everything is easier and must be better than living like he is now in fear of the Landlord, the Steward, and his family finding out who he really is.

After all the adventures John goes on, discovering himself along the way, he ends up learning the person behind the mask is who the Landlord knows and cares about. He doesn't have to wear the itchy clothes and mask because he belongs to the Landlord. He knows the truth of how John ran away in search of his love for the island and doesn't care. The Landlord actually is just and good. He knows who John is through and through and loves him.

I'll admit I wear a mask a lot of the time. I'm the "strong dependable friend with all the answers", a "sci-fi/fantasy geek", and in my neighborhood the "waving cat lady". We all wear a type of mask. It is the persona or label of who we want the world to believe we are. We are a "good mom" because we think nobody needs to know the struggles of keeping up with the kids. We are a "strong man" who can carry the weight and pressures of the world, yet we just want a break from it all, to rest. We are "fine" because we think nobody wants to see tears or know we are not in fact fine. We think we are alone on our journey and so we put on our itchy cloths and our masks to make the best of it. The truth is we are not alone. The Landlord is watching. He is right beside you. He loves you.

All who are led by God's Spirit are God's sons and daughters. You didn't receive a spirit of slavery to lead you back again into fear, but you received a Spirit that shows you are adopted as his children. With this Spirit, we cry, "Abba, Father." The same Spirit agrees with our spirit, that we are God's children.

There are so many lies the world tells us and one of the biggest is "you are not good enough". The truth can be found when we become brave, take our masks off, and sit before God. He knows everything about you, everything you have ever done, and everything you can do. In knowing every hair and every inch of you He still calls you His. One of my favorite bible passages is Romans 8. I encourage you to read the chapter, then ask who are you really. Are you the mask or the person behind it?
