LETTER FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR, DON GIBSON

Hello all and blessings, I pray this letter find you well and blessed as we close out the summer and move into the fall. Recently, after questions and conversations around news of disaffiliation or change in the United Methodist Church, I have made myself available to speak with individuals or groups to offer some clarity, answer questions, and encourage our faithfulness in the mission of making disciples for the transformation of the world. It was brought to my attention that some members are not currently connected in the ways that information is shared, and suggested, that I present it in a written document- what a great idea.

THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH AND DISAFFILIATION:

Recently questions have resurfaced regarding the future of the United Methodist Church as there are many news reports of UM churches disaffiliating (or leaving the denomination). If you recall, more than three years ago the church voted (at General Conference) to maintain its current stance (the Traditional Plan) on issues dividing the churchprimarily the interpretation of scripture around human sexuality. The vote also included preserving the current UMC Book of Discipline and enforcing it when violations occur. The decision, the vote to retain the traditional stance, was immediately met with opposition and new legislation (the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation-a move toward an amicable split) was drawn up and was to be voted on in 2020. However, the worldwide pandemic prohibited this vote. The United Methodist Church (globally) was to meet this year (General Conference 2022) to vote on this legislation, however it was decided by the Council of Bishops to postpone the vote until 2024. As a result of the decision to prolong the vote, the Global Methodist Church (the new denomination forming to provide a church home for those choosing to exit the United Methodist church after the spilt) decided not to wait until 2024 to launch and did so on May 1st of this year, 2022. Currently churches and pastors are disaffiliating from the UMC and affiliating with the Global Methodist Church and other denominations. I have been meeting with individuals, Sunday School classes, United Women of Faith Circles, and other groups to share this information and answer questions. I, along with your pastoral staff, sense that it is in the best interest of Beulah UMC to be open and transparent regarding these realities and to commit ourselves to continued faithfulness in prayer, discernment, and the gleaning of information because we must be prepared to make a decision, how and when needed, and as God moves us to do so.

MORE NEWS:

Annual Conference 2022: Our delegates for Annual Conference this year (Ken and Beth Spitzley) were unable to attend so myself, Pastor Daniel, and Pastor Pam represented Beulah UMC. News to note from this year's Annual Conference was the merging of Districts (and Superintendents) from 16 Districts and 16 Districts Superintendents to 8 (see the image below).

Here is the explanation for this change: (taken from the Virginia United Methodist website- District Alignment)

Why are changes needed at all? Our churches sit within a larger landscape of adaptive challenges for the 21st century. In the midst of decline and the growing disinterest and disconnection with the church in our communities, the urgency of the Gospel has never been more palpable. More than ever, our commitment must be for the mission of the church to drive the institution, rather than the institution driving the mission.

Among the feedback we have already received has been the question of whether now is the right time to make changes – amidst the uncertainty of a pandemic, the unease of a looming General Conference, our country's racial and political division, and the impact all these challenges have on church ministry.

Our answer to this question is that these challenges named are precisely why change is needed now. We can choose to WAIT, or we can choose to ACT. We can choose the status quo, or we can choose the new thing God is doing in our midst, in our churches, and in our communities. These adaptive challenges have the capacity to turn us inward toward our own survival, or they have the capacity to turn us outward toward the world that needs the church to offer something new, something substantive, something inspiring in this very moment.

We choose to step out boldly in faith with a strategy that will do the following three important things:

- 1) Resource our clergy
- 2) Foster clergy-clergy and church-church collaboration
- 3) Collaboratively engage our communities in new ways
